SUBJECT: Housing Guidelines for Isolation of Personnel with COVID-19 Symptoms

The term isolation is used for individuals who are having symptoms of or are diagnosed with COVID-19. The decision to isolate a person under investigation is to prevent further spread of disease. Persons under investigation will be required to isolate themselves in their residence until such time as lab results are returned. The majority of COVID-19 cases do not need hospitalization unless they have severe disease.

IAW with the CDC, COVID-19 can be isolated within their residence, if they DO NOT require continuing medical care, the exceptions to this are:

- Cases who reside in shared open bay housing, such as the dorms
- Cases who reside within the same household as an individual identified as mission critical
- Cases with a high risk member in their household on SAFB

For the exceptions above, under recommendation of Public Health authorities, 375 FSS will arrange for these individuals to remain in TLF for the duration of their illness. Two or more individuals diagnosed with COVID-19, can reside in the same unit if space requires it.

The patients will be provided with written guidance by their Healthcare Provider and the Public Health Flight as appropriate.
