SUBJECT: Updated Mask Guidelines for Scott Air Force Base Personnel

1. In accordance with applicable references listed above, effective today, fully vaccinated DoD personnel (who are at least two weeks beyond their final dose) are no longer required to wear a mask indoors or outdoors on Scott AFB. Personnel who are not fully vaccinated should continue to follow applicable DoD mask guidance, including continuing to wear masks indoors. Scott AFB is taking the following steps to balance mission with public health during the pandemic (the following measures supersede previous guidance):

- Fitness centers will no longer require fully vaccinated personnel to wear masks. Adequate spacing between equipment will remain in place to protect all patrons.
- Commanders and supervisors must not ask about civilian employee's vaccination status or use such information when making employment decisions. Additionally, commanders and supervisors must work with the Civilian Personnel Office for Union notification prior to implementing changes to working conditions.
- As a guideline, Scott AFB will continue to align with the Illinois Dept of Public Health Implementation of the Restore Illinois Bridge Phase Memo (Reference b) to the max extent possible. Divergence from this guidance will be by exception.
- Consistent with CDC guidelines, personnel will still be required to wear masks in medical facilities on base and are encouraged to follow additional guidance published by the CDC.
